

I would like to now invite Honourable Clare O'Neil, Federal Minister for Housing and Minister for Homelessness to the stage to say a few words.

Our first key note speaker tonight- a Hughesdale Alumni, was born on the Sunny Coast Queensland and began surfing as a child in Maroochydore. His family moved to Melbourne and he attended Hughesdale Primary School before going on to complete his high school education at Brighton Grammer.

In March of 1969, towards the end of a surfing trip he asked his mate "Do you want to start making surfboards together?" His mate said yes... the timing was perfect... and just like that an Aussie icon and global success Rip Curl was born.

He is credited with bringing international surfing competition to Bells Beach aptly known as the Rip Curl Pro. He has mentored the likes of surfing greats like Tom Curren and Mick Fanning. And in 2010... he was inducted into the Australian Surfing Hall of Fame, may I hear the biggest Hughesdale roar as you put your hands together for Mr. Doug Warbrick.



Our next guest speaker is a former student at HPS who was taught by Mr. Tanner himself. She has gone on to pursue a career in the arts. She is a singer, musical theatre and cabaret artist. Danielle is best known for her portrayal of Shirley Bassey in the biopic The Songs of Shirley Bassey that she preformed at sold out shows. She has featured in various concerts and TV appearances including Carols by Candlelight and performing the Australian national anthem live at the MCG. She is the co-artistic director of the award winning Choir of Hard Knocks.

In 2020, she brought us The musical parodies of her in a wheelie bin which became a youtube sensation where she shared her reflections on being in the most locked down state in covid. Could you please put your hands together for Danielle Matthews.



Our final guest speaker is a passionate leader within the education space. Craig Tanner was the principal of Hughesdale Primary School from 1993-2017 – an incredible 24 years of service to our community.

He used his transformational and adaptive leadership style alongside his strong advocacy to save the school from merger in the late 1990's.

Craig used his experience to drive positive policy changes inside the Department of Education. He is continuing to shape the education landscape through his contribution to the National Curriculum Services an organisation that provides education consultancy, professional learning services.

Craig's legacy continues in the new classroom building named in his honour at our school known as the Tanner Building - although Craig in your building a veranda could have been helpful for those hail storms that hit as the bell goes at 3.30 - but we won't hold that against you... can I now welcome to the stage the legend himself, Mr. Craig Tanner.

# MY REFLECTIONS RODNEY LAMBERT

#### **MONITORS**

One of the features of all schools in Australia in the 1900s was the use of monitors as student volunteers to undertake specific duties.

Hughesdale was no different and in the 1950s and 1960s had monitors for at least the following tasks:

- · distribution of milk;
- · distribution of ink;
- cleaning and maintenance of blackboards;
- · housekeeping in the staff room.

In the 1950s fresh pasteurised milk was delivered by the state government to all primary schools nominally as a public health measure, to ensure all school children were well nourished. (This policy also provided a guaranteed and lucrative market for the dairy farmers and supporters of various political parties at the time.) Generally, daily milk rations were appreciated by most of the students and there were never any leftovers at the end of the day. Delivering a fresh milk ration daily to more than 1100 students presented a significant workload at Hughesdale and this is where the Milk Monitors came into their own. I believe there were about 6 monitors at any given time, selected from the more senior (and stronger) year 5/6 students. My memory is that the monitors were mostly boys.

Milk was delivered by a truck/van at about 7.00 am and left in the outside quadrangle. It was contained in small 1/3-pint bottles with



crimped aluminium foil caps. Each wooden crate contained about 50 bottles and there were about 22 crates of milk to be delivered to the classrooms where it was consumed.

Milk monitors arrived at school early and ensured each classroom had its correct milk ration before the first lessons commenced around 9.00 am. The monitors also presented to their own classrooms for roll call and to commence their own lessons for the day.

By 10.00 am it was time for the Monitors to fetch empty milk bottles and crates from the classrooms and return them to a stacking area where they were retrieved by the delivery truck next morning. I remember noting on

one morning that I returned to the classroom at 11am after the milk bottle retrievals were completed. I then had to finish my assigned work before the lunch break commenced.


Students didn't receive pen licences in the 1950s and 1960s. Rather, at a particular time – I think it was grade 3 – they just automatically moved from pencils to pen and ink. Each desk had an inkwell that had to be filled each day by the ink monitors. The more senior monitors had the job of mixing up the ink powder with water and distributing the resultant ink to each classroom. The subset of monitors then filled each inkwell.

Each class had a blackboard monitor who had to make sure the blackboard was clean at the start of each day. This was sometimes problematic if a teacher had come in over the weekend, or stayed for a while after school, to prepare some complex piece of work or drawing on the blackboard – only for it to be erased before the class started! The blackboard monitors also had to ensure the blackboard dusters were clean and ready for use.

And finally, a group of mostly girls were on duty as monitors in the staff room after little lunch each day to wash and dry the crockery and generally clean up after the teachers' morning tea.

The use of students as monitors really instilled in all of us the value of volunteering. Most students wanted to be a monitor at some stage of their school life at Hughesdale.



#### MY REFLECTIONS KARMA WILSON







As a past student and a current parent at Hughesdale Primary, I thought it would be nice to share my experience with this amazing school.

I grew up in Murrumbeena and attended Hughesdale back in the 80's when Bernard Greenwood was the school Principal. My eldest son graduated last year and my youngest son is currently in Grade 3.

To help refresh my memories I dug out my old school photos and was surprised at how hard it was to find one of me wearing the school uniform. Casual dress was very common back then and all I could think of was my poor mum having to decide what to dress both her daughters in each day. I will never forgive her for the excessive use of skivvies though.

My dad was on the school council for a number of years and to this day he still talks about when the school purchased a 'state of the art' colour photocopier. Progressive times indeed. My mum spent many hours helping the school out with readers and being a part of the Parent's Association. When she went back to work my sister and I would walk to and from school using the path that used to cut through from Brine St to Oakleigh Tech which is now Argyle Reserve. It's all houses now.

We weren't so sun smart back then either. We didn't have to wear hats and there was no 'Great Green' or 'Big Blue' to protect us and we certainly didn't have an indoor gym for assemblies. I still remember standing out in the quadrangle rain, hail or shine to sing the national anthem God Save the Queen!

I learnt Greek as a language and in Grade 6 I was House Captain for Churchill (Red). School camps to Somers and Canberra were a lot of fun and I remember getting my 15 minutes of fame when I was one of the students in Mr Davidson's class selected to go on a Channel 7 gardening show. This is where my lifelong love of gardening began.

My fondest memory, like many kids back then, is of the old Milk Bar on Brine St where our lunch orders came from. I invested a lot of 20 cent coins on bags of mixed lollies there. Perhaps it's a blessing in disguise that it's gone now as I'm certain my kids would be big spenders there too.

I was really pleased that my youngest son was able to stand in the 100 year aerial photo this year. Many years ago, I was a student standing in the 60 year photo. Mine was taken out of an upstairs window though as drones did not exist then!

A lot has changed since I was a student, but the wonderful sense of community has remained which makes it a truly special place for both students and parents alike. I am certain both my sons have loved being a part of Hughesdale Primary School as much as I have.






